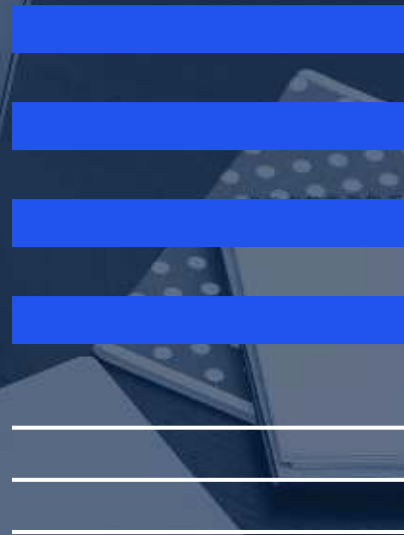

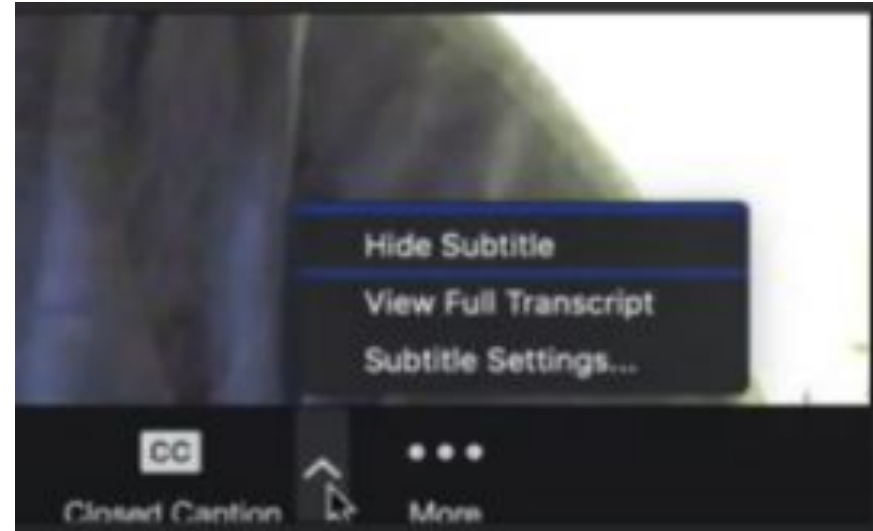

Considering Needs of Both Students & Professors Themselves

“I work with students with moderate to severe disabilities who often need hand over hand assistance, physical prompting and supplies and processes adapted in the moment...my students either don't have access to a computer or lack the skills to work with one without an intermediary.”

“I am visually impaired and have been finding it difficult to take classes let alone teach them. Person to person, in my classes I teach, I can put people's work up close to my face, use my video magnifier, Orman ocular, or walk up close to students and see what they're doing, sometimes with a staff person's description. All of these things are missing now and for the first time in my life I am having a lot of trouble adapting.”

 - If so, how can the barrier be removed and greater access be provided?
 - Content
 - Peer to peer engagement
 - Assessment

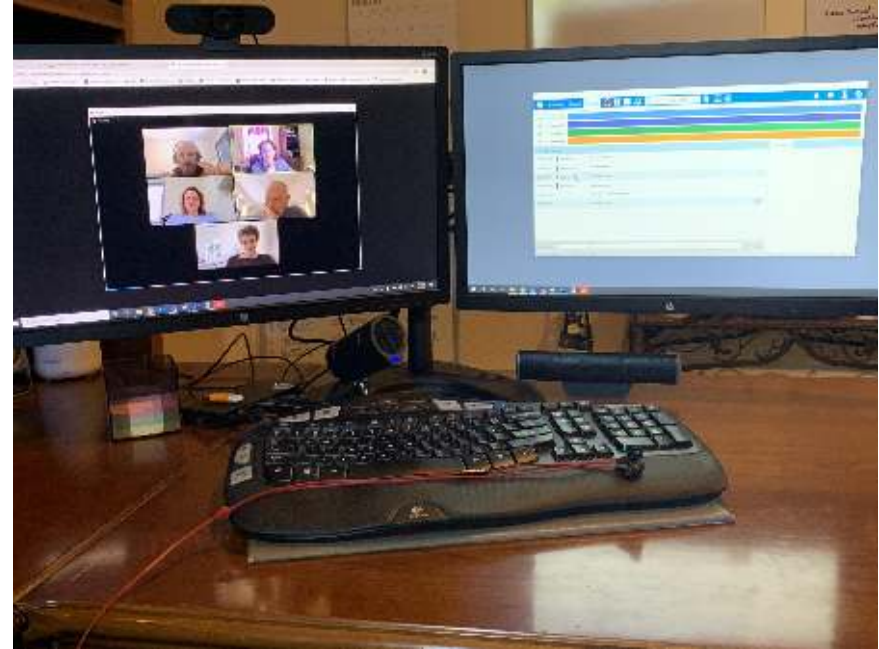

Keeping Students Engaged

- Clear learning path
- Varying ways to engage
- Assignments that promote engagement

In a Discussion Board

- Don't ask Yes or No questions
- The Onion approach - ask a discussion question, when discussions start to taper off, ask a follow up leading question at the next layer for deeper processing and discussions.

Is it interesting - Ask the question "So what?"



How can we help students who must now test at home, but otherwise would have had **distraction-reduced testing locations?**



Helpful Guides To Address Students' Location Needs

- Ditch the devices
 - Organize the workspace
 - Address annoying sounds
 - Encourage a healthy lifestyle - get sleep

Providing Support Systems & Trained Professionals

- Identify what the struggle is
 - Overall coping with COVID-19, many schools have brought in therapists, coaches and counselors
 - Self direction and discipline, provide 10 minute phone check-ins two or three times a week
 - Comprehension of content, peer to peer mentoring by pairing the students in the class
-

University Investments

- Pulling from other areas that are cost savings
 - Pulling from contingency or emergency funds
 - Aligning budgets with the reality of today
-



For students on the spectrum what accommodation ideas do you have when they **struggle with understanding the written word** and are used to interacting with the professor and asking lots of questions for clarification of concepts and assignments?



Accommodation Ideas

- First, always ask the student
 - Provide options such as video or audio
 - Peer learning
 - 1 on 1 sessions with the student
-

Benefits of Accessibility

- Start with the familiar to bridge to the unfamiliar
 - Our goals are the same, greater student success
-
